
"Not that I have already obtained this [obedience to Christ] or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own." Philippians 3:12

No one likes change, except perhaps the baby and his diaper. Nevertheless, change is all around us - a good deal of it negative, and yet, some of it positive. There is even change as a part of being the church.

Take for instance the season of LENT. In its deepest meaning, it too is about CHANGE. On Ash Wednesday we place ashes on our foreheads mindful of the ways that we have failed to live as Christ's disciples-and we promise to change. Throughout the weeks of Lent we consider the depths of our Lord's love for us, and the ways that we have been less than loving toward God and neighbor-and we promise to change. We consider giving up something negative for Lent- or even perhaps adding something positive to our lives- and that involves change. Another word for change is "repent". We recognize those things in our lives that are not working the way that God intended, and we make an effort to change direction. But that kind of positive change seldom happens overnight.

We are all works in progress. Paul admits as much about himself as he talks about always having to "press on" toward the goal of the complete Christians life. Surely, if Paul had work to do, so do we.

Our ability to change is often blocked by the same old stumbling block of inertia. We know what we would like, but we don't know how to get there. We know what needs to change in our lives, but we don't quite know how to do it. We sense that



being more disciplined is the key, but we aren't sure how to harness that power in our lives.

Perhaps you recognize a need to pray or worship more often. Maybe you see that self-indulgence needs to be tamed by committing yourself to some kind of service to others. Quite possibly, you know that your relationship with a loved one needs special attention. Whatever the needed change may be-set a goal and work toward it.

Setbacks inevitably occur along the way. But don't give up. Keep your eye on the goal. Don't take on everything at once. Focus on one small step at a time. And then, when that has been accomplished, get ready to tackle the next. And should you fall short, remember that forgiveness is the flip-side of the coin to repentance. God forgives, so don't forget to forgive yourself as well.

The Lenten season is a good time to make some positive changes. Keep your eye on what Paul calls the "prize". After forty days, Easter follows. Talk about change!

I wanted to report to you on the work that we have done in 2017. We are fortunate to have a wonderful group of leaders in the congregation, who all played a part in completing this work.

- A new Council took office at the end of June. Susan Fickert moved from Council At Large to our Council Secretary. Larry Gustafson and Andrew Leach were elected as members at large. We also appointed Joe Ackerman to Susan's vacant at large position. Glenn Kraft joined Council as President-elect.
- The WHIRL efforts succeeded in developing programs in Worship, Healing, Involvement, Relationships and Leadership (WHIRL).
- Established "*Cancer Now What?*" along with revitalizing our Stephens Ministry program, training several new Stephens Ministry members
- Hired a new Contemporary Worship Leader.
- Kicked off two new Relationship efforts, Brews n Hymns and Father Figures, along with cataloging our small groups.
- Reinvigorated our efforts at developing future leaders in the congregation.
- We ran a successful Capital Campaign, Go to Grow, achieving just shy of our initial goal of \$2,000,000.
- Our average weekly attendance in 2017 was 469 and we added 76 new members.
- The Feed My Starving Children taskforce achieved over 850,000 meals pack for the children of Haiti. This is our 11th year of continued accomplishment and service.
- In fulfillment of our Mission, we participated in a wide variety of service activities and mission projects, too numerous to mention here - but please read the individual committee and ministry team reports in the annual report, [Link Here](#).

- We completed the renovation, or remake, of the church kitchen. Please be sure you check it out. A new handicap entry was installed on the north door of the sanctuary level. New speakers were installed in the Sanctuary in time for Easter. We replace old gutter with new that has larger capacity. All the doors in the lower level were varnished.
- Our Pastors and our Ministry teams (in particular: Children, Youth, Worship and Music) continued to provide outstanding service and leadership in our collective worship life. We are in debt to all who serve in our Worship Services.
- There is much to accomplish in 2018. We must not lose sight of our mission: "Following Christ, Growing in Faith, Sharing God's Love".

Here are my hopes and goals for Good Shepherd in 2018:

- Continue to grow membership and worship attendance
- Continue our efforts to improve all our worship services
- Increase annual giving to support our vibrant ministry
- Adopt a strategic plan to achieve measurable goals
- Support our Mission with our time, talent and treasure

We are all anxious to finish our strategic plan, and an overview will be presented at the congregational meeting Sunday, January 28th. I pray that you will be able to attend this important meeting.

This is the Year of Awareness for GSLC's Endowment Fund!

Donations to the Endowment Fund are designed to last forever. Only 5% of the Fund's principal is spent in any given year to fund Missions within GSLC, as well as in our community, the nation and the world.



To increase your Awareness of the Endowment, we have inserted a specially-designed bookmark into every hymnal. Additionally, on the glass-topped table leading into the Sanctuary, there are two Lucite holders.

One contains trifold brochures, which explain the purpose and structure of the Endowment, as well as examples of past Grants and some of the many ways you can give, both currently and as part of your estate planning.

The other Lucite holder has Giving Envelopes, which may be used to commemorate any special event, such as a birthday, an anniversary, the memory of a loved one, or "just because." The Envelopes are already stamped, so you don't even have to hunt for one at home. Donors and honorees will be recognized quarterly.

Remember, a gift to the Endowment Fund is a gift that keeps on giving!





The Next Day

A few days ago I read a post on Facebook about a bunch of young teenagers who went to a restaurant before their Homecoming dance. Their waiter was very kind and accommodating, especially towards the girl with food allergies, and the group had a wonderful "grown up" dinner before they went on their way. It also tells that when the bill came, the teens realized all they had left for a tip was \$3.28. It mentions how the waiter was "frustrated" and "annoyed with them" that night, but that the next day, one of the girls came back to the restaurant with a note from all four of them explaining the situation and leaving a proper tip. As can be the norm on Facebook, the comments on the article ranged from extreme praise towards the teens for doing the right thing, to praise for the parents for teaching them proper tipping etiquette, to down-right insulting.

This made me think back to last weekend when I sent my newly teenaged son to his first QUAKE! gathering. We were given a list of things to bring, and one of the items was money for the Sunday offering. I gave him the list and told him to go pack when he asked me for money for worship. I replied, "I paid for you to go. All other money, be it for spending or the offering, needs to be yours." When he got back Sunday afternoon, I asked about the weekend and said, "What did you do about the money for worship?" and he replied that he used some money from his wallet. I nodded "good job" as Facebook-esque comments swirled in my head. You may remember that last summer the boys and I started a "blessing jar" where we would save money and use it towards various charities and causes. So far we have donated money to the ELCA, purchased food for the monthly food pantry, and used it for Christmas presents for the Giving Tree. We don't hit the "proper" amount every time in our jar, or with the teen's offering, or sometimes even with our family offering, but we try to make it up the "next day."

In my annual report, I expressed my gratitude to the congregation for their support

of the "In Unity We Grow" campaign, as well as to all who joined a new team or ministry area or volunteered more of their time to the church. Thank you, all of these contributions work together to create a healthy stewardship environment today and every "next day" here at Good Shepherd.


Our "*Cancer-Now What?*" Ministry Is Reaching and Helping People beyond Our Congregation

The Service Team helps to organize many service-related activities within the church and one of those opportunities is coming upon us quickly - Lent. We will again have the reverse offering, which, if you recall, occurs during collection time, the collection plate is passed down the pew and after that another plate is passed which contains slips of paper indicating an agency we would like to support and a list of suggested items they could use. These items are brought back to church the following Sunday, and again at collection time you will have the opportunity to help another agency by picking a slip with their requests. This will continue for five weeks. The agencies we will be supporting this year are: Trinity Soulard, Circle of Concern, Project Backpack, Fisher House, and Nurses for Newborns.



The Prayer Shawl Ministry, which is a part of the Service Team has been quite busy since it started in 2009. This Ministry was able to provide 49 shawls during this last year.

The Food Bin (Meal-a-Month) for February will support Wings/Love and Youth Center in the Benton Park neighborhood. The items they are requesting are: Spaghetti Noodles (dry, NOT canned) Boxes of Macaroni and Cheese and Cans of Glory Greens.

Monthly Benevolence Fund: Each month the Service Team has a theme which helps guide the selection of recipients for that month's Benevolence Fund disbursements. The theme for January was "Missions." The Team researched several agencies and we were able to help Brian Tucker (Community of Hope in Haiti), ELCA Missions in Papua New Guinea and Russia, International Partners in Mission, Heat-Up/Cool Down St. Louis and World Servants to support student Syombua (Suvia Children's Home).

Who are the agencies we support: Heat-Up/Cool Down St. Louis This

organization is a non-profit 501 (C)(3) charity that focuses on helping area elderly and disabled people and low-income families, with their delinquent heating bills in Missouri and Illinois in the St. Louis region, that began its operation in December of 2000. 100% of all public and private donations go to helping the needy.

The Service Team meets on the first Monday of the month - the next meeting is scheduled for Monday, February 5, 2018 - Room 205. We are always looking for new members to support this worthwhile ministry at Good Shepherd - Please joins us!

Ring, Ring, Ring - "Sorry, I have to take this call." Have you ever had someone interrupt your conversation because they had to answer their phone? How often are you interrupted by calls while you are conversing, eating, working or relaxing?
