



Finding Peace during Advent

Christmas is quickly approaching, ready or not!

This season of Advent, when we prepare for Christ's "coming," can be a very hectic time. During this so-called "holiday season" it is easy to be rushed, stressed and overwhelmed. As Christmas nears, we worry about buying gifts, fighting the crowds and making complicated plans with extended, and often distant family members. Sometimes, it feels like more than we can handle.

Maybe that's why the church celebrates this season differently. Advent, for us, is a reminder to focus on what's really important—to wait with sacred expectation for what God has done and is doing in our world and lives. In contrast to the rushed atmosphere of the marketplace, we instead slow down in an effort to cultivate peace in our hearts and provide room for an appreciation of the ever-present love of God that has been given to us.

Here are some well-worn practices that may help us make this Advent season more meaningful as we await the coming of the Christ child.

1. **Pray.** Find some time to read a devotional or pray each day. Before the many demands of the day overwhelm you, slow down, take a deep breath and reconnect with God.
2. **Say "no".** Don't over commit or pressure yourself to do more than is healthy or helpful. Give yourself permission to say "no" and prioritize the best use of your time and energy.
3. **Limit social media.** Rather than constantly checking your notifications, think about actually connecting with a friend in person. Give them a call, or write them a note. Or if you're feeling overwhelmed, go outside for a walk; notice the sights, smells and sounds around you.
4. **Focus on presence, not presents.** One of the themes of Advent is that Jesus is

literally “Emmanuel—God with us”. Remind yourself of the real gift of love that is ours and comes from God. This gift wasn’t wrapped up in fancy paper with a bow on top. It came in a manger and on a cross. And He is with us still. That’s the Christmas presence that really matters!

Everyone wants to belong; to fit in, to be accepted, to have a home. Having a church home is important in the life of a Christian. It is a place where you love to go to worship and learn about God with fellow believers. Good Shepherd is such a place for us and we want to grow our family. The "You Belong" committee was formed to study how we might do that as a congregation. We are largely a white middle-class congregation. That's who has felt most comfortable here so far. Does this reflect the makeup of all God's children? The committee was made aware of member families who were not feeling supported or accepted here at Good Shepherd because of their sexual orientation or gender identity. These members were not worshipping here because of their discomfort. Here was an opportunity to look at our welcome statement and our policies to see if there was a need for clarification. Our web site says "all are welcome" yet here were current members who did not always feel welcome.

Within the ELCA there is a program called "Reconciling in Christ". This program recognizes congregations and Lutheran organizations that declare themselves welcoming to all people regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity. There are over 750 Lutheran faith communities that specifically welcome LGBTQ people. At the center of this process is an opportunity to engage in loving conversation with each other and learn more about those who we share this space with already as well as those who are not yet represented here. This is an important process designed to knit the many colors of our community more closely together, rather than merely a one-time decision. There are many factors to be considered in welcoming any group, such as accessibility, resources for support, activities that are all inclusive and perhaps help for specific needs. In welcoming potential members, it is important to get to know them. What are their likes, dislikes, needs, talents and hobbies? In knowing these things, it is easier to welcome them into our

many ministries for the growth and improvement of Good Shepherd. The "You Belong" committee has hosted a talk by Dr. Sarah Garwood on issues faced by gay and transgender youth and how the church could make a difference in their lives. There has also been an Adult Ed class on homosexuality and the Bible. November saw a video and discussion session where we got the chance to hear first-hand experiences of LGBTQ people from inside and outside our community here. There will be more opportunities to learn and discuss the issue of LGBTQ people here at Good Shepherd in the coming months. These are some of the issues that we can consider as we shape the future of our church. We hope you find a way to participate in this church-wide conversation that is comfortable for you.

All are welcome. How does Good Shepherd define 'welcome'? How much of God's family should feel belonging at Good Shepherd? Only we as members can make our answers a reality.
