Navigating the Unknown

When God freed the Israelites from slavery under Pharaoh, it did not take long for the people to become afraid and yearn to return to the comfort of the familiar. They were thirsty. They were hungry. They were wandering through a wilderness without homes nor any idea where they would end up. They said Moses and Aaron:

“If only we had died by the hand of the LORD in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the fleshpots and ate our fill of bread; for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger.” – Ex. 16:3

The LORD heard their cry, and once again, God provided:

“The LORD spoke to Moses and said... ‘At twilight you shall eat meat, and in the morning you shall have your fill of bread; then you shall know that I am the LORD your God.’ In the evening quails came up and covered the camp; and in the morning there was a layer of dew around the camp. When the layer of dew lifted, there on the surface of the wilderness was a fine flaky substance, as fine as frost on the ground.” - Ex. 16:12-14

In many ways, these past months have felt like a season of wilderness and wandering. So much of what we knew has been disrupted and we continue to live in the tension of uncertainty. Yet God is with us, providing and guiding. We are thankful for all the ways ministry has happened digitally and the ways the Spirit has continued to work, yet we are filled with hope at the prospect of gathering together again. As we slowly return to worship and various ministries in our facilities, many aspects of this experience will be different for a while. It is our goal to keep you informed as much as possible so we can keep one another as safe as possible.

As we return to worship in our building, we are implementing a worship plan to keep our members safe. This includes:

- Limiting the number of people to allow space to socially distance
- Advance sign up for worship
- Wearing masks
- Modifying parts of the service to worship without physical contact
- Thorough sanitizing and preventative treatments
- Clear signage and checking temperatures (with touchless thermometers)

As smaller groups begin meeting in our building, we will be asking that groups:

- All enter through the main entrance (North door)
- Sign in with names of all attendees
- Wear masks and socially distance
- Meet in larger rooms and schedule all meetings with the office (so we can sanitize)

We give thanks for your patience, support, and flexibility as we continue to navigate these changing waters. These next few months will continue to be ever-adapting to meet the needs of keeping members safe and doing ministry. Even as we begin relaxing some of our restrictions, we may find ourselves reverting to a more restrictive phase if there is a resurgence of infections. We continue to plan, monitor, adapt, and communicate.

As we navigate these uncertain times and sail through these unknown waters, we pray that God will continue to lead us. God led the Israelites from slavery to freedom, and from the wilderness to the promised land. We trust that God will lead us today, as well.

“The LORD went in front of them in a pillar of cloud by day, to lead them along the way, and in a pillar of fire by night, to give them light, so that they might travel by day and by night.” – Ex. 13:21
