Dear beloved,

In Galatians 6 Paul writes, *“Bear one another’s burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ.”* We are living through some of the most rapidly changing, challenging, polarizing, and defining years that we have ever experienced in our lifetimes. We feel the burden of these times. Our nation (and our world) continues to crash up against highly emotional, highly complex issues for which there are no simple solutions and for which there is likely no going back to the status quo. On Friday, June 24 the Supreme Court overturned the long-held precedent of *Roe vs. Wade*, sparking intense emotions and reactions all across the country.

This is an extremely important issue. It is also a phenomenally complex and emotional issue. Within the Church, good people of faith have a wide range of feelings about and experiences with abortion. For some this is deeply, deeply personal. Within our own congregation I am sure we have differing perspectives and feelings in response to this dramatic and sudden change. My goal today is not to tell anyone what to think about these questions, but to offer words of hope, encouragement, and guidance as you navigate your own emotions and about how we might move forward as the people of God.

First, ***I invite us to listen deeply.***

Listen to one another with empathetic hearts. Be compassionate. Be curious. Be kind. When we can listen to one another in love, especially in the Church, I have most often found that we have more in common that we would have ever thought. It is only in moving beyond the binary either-or, us-them, all-or-nothing extremes that we find healthy paths forward. We must reject the cultural battle cries to label one another. The truth is (at least in my experience) almost *none of us* fall into these clear-cut extremes, but rather find ourselves on a journey, wrestling with complex questions somewhere in the middle.

One of the things I have long valued about the ELCA is the willingness to acknowledge different perspectives and live in the messy space that exists when we wrestle with difficult questions. I have found [the ELCA Social Statement on Abortion](#) helpful because it probes the depths of the moral complexity of this issue. I appreciate how our statement rejects either/or thinking and draws to light the many difficult emotions and questions we must face when we think about abortion, including both the life of a woman and the life developing in a womb.

Every week in worship we pray, “Thy kingdom come.” I believe we all long for a world where every human being has enough to eat, has a home, and is cared for. We all long for a world where every person knows the joy of having loving, healthy, and supportive relationships. We all long for a world where no one finds themselves facing the painful circumstances of considering ending a pregnancy. So even while we wrestle as a society, a state, a nation with laws, we Christians will continue to work for God’s kingdom to come. We will continue to feed the hungry, care for the poor and downtrodden, continue to help all people live lives of dignity and worth. We will continue to support and care for any in need. May we continue to love one another, pray without ceasing, and strive for God’s kingdom come every moment of every day. *As God’s chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony. And let the peace of Christ rule in your hearts, to which indeed you were called in the one body.* - **Colossians 3:12-15**

**Feed the Need STL food packing event – new date, location, and higher goals! Help pack food for Feed My Starving Children.**

St. Louis County Parks Department has informed us that due to construction delays encountered during their renovations, they are unable to host our Feed the Need STL food packing event previously scheduled for August.



However, we have found a great alternative: the Kennedy Recreation Center in South County. Kennedy recreation center is nearly a twin to the Queeny facility and is located just 10 miles south of Good Shepherd Lutheran. Kennedy is available September 8th thru 11th. Because we have an extra month for fundraising, and due also to your significant generosity, we are raising pack goals to 1 million meals feeding 2,750 kids for a year. There will be almost 4,000 volunteer opportunities at the Kennedy pack including spots for helping with set-up, clean-up, and registration and also to help as greeters and guides. Please sign up for a shift or two and invite friends and family. Note the new packing dates September 8th through the 11th.
