There are approximately **seventy-five people involved in one or more music groups each month!** Many people have found this to be a profound way to feel connected to others and connected to God.

With the beginning of fall, many of the music groups have reconvened after a summer break and all groups are ready to welcome new participants at any time. Groups meet on a variety of schedules (see below) and serve in worship anywhere from once a month to once a week. VOCAL MUSIC GROUPS

Faith Choir (SATB) Mixed choir is open to 9th grade and above. This group meets on 2 Thursdays per month at 7pm and serves in worship 1-2 times a month.

Celebration Chorus (TTBB) Bass clef choir open to singers who are 9th grade and

above. This group meets on the 3rd Thursday of the month at 8:15 pm and serves in worship once a month.

LOLs (Ladies of the Lord Singers) is open to treble clef singers who are 6th grade and above. This group meets on Sunday morning at 10:00 am as scheduled and serves in worship once a month.

Contemporary Choir is a mixed voice choir that meets on Thursday or Sunday as scheduled and sings in worship every 4-6 weeks at the 11am worship service accompanied by the worship band.

Joint Choir is comprised of singers from all choirs as well as others from the congregation who like to sing occasionally. This group sings on Festival Sundays like Reformation or All Saints in the Fall; Transfiguration in the Winter and Pentecost or Holy Trinity Sunday in the Spring/Summer.

Christmas Cantata Choir is also comprised of singers from all choirs as well as others from the congregation who like to sing during this 10-week season. This group rehearses from early October through mid-December to work on a Christmas Cantata which will be presented in worship the 2nd weekend of December and is accompanied by an orchestra.

Lead Pastor

On September 18-19, I was able to spend time with our Bishop, Susan Candea, along with other Central States Synod staff and area ELCA church leaders. Bishop Candea shared updates about things

happening in the Synod and the state of congregations. One of the challenges she talked about was not surprising. "There is so much division in our country today and it has been creeping into our congregations." As we talked about these difficult stories, I felt grateful because my experience at Good Shepherd has been quite different.

Over the past few years, I have heard stories of pastors leaving ministry. The anger, vitriol, and mistrust became too much to bear. I've heard personal stories from colleagues, and I listen to a *lot* of podcasts about the state of the Church (some fantastic podcast resources came out during the pandemic to help us walk together through these unprecedented times). Pastors hear angry feedback that they are too political/liberal/conservative, and after the *same sermon* have other members upset that they are not political/liberal/conservative enough! During the pandemic many church leaders experienced anger and fighting, where some members said, "we are too restrictive on these safety measures," and at the same time others shouting, "we are not doing enough to keep people safe!" For many, there seemed only to be lose, lose scenarios on multiple fronts.

As I hear these stories two emotions well up inside me. First, heartbreak for our siblings in Christ and concern for the Church. Second, gratitude. deep and abiding gratitude for *this community*, Good Shepherd. I am so proud of this church. My experience at Good Shepherd over these past few tumultuous years has been one of grace, patience, kindness, and understanding.

When we made difficult decisions about how to respond to the pandemic, did we all agree? No, but we talked with kindness and came together for the well-being of one another. We continued to love one another and unite around our mission. When tensions in our government or social issues in society threatened to overwhelm, I have experienced a holy respect here. You listen to one another. We refuse to put others in a box, but recognize that we are all unique individuals with varied experiences and feelings. I have seen you approach one another with understanding and curiosity, *antidotes* to the anger and judgement to world so quickly professes.

At Good Shepherd, we believe that in Christ's Church there is no such thing as 'the left' or 'the right', but only fellow siblings in Christ, beloved children of God for whom Christ died. The freedom and joy found in this truth releases us from the power of anger, fear, and resentment and opens the path to deeper, richer relationships. I have been so deeply blessed by holy conversations with many of you around topics of which we don't always agree. I have found these opportunities don't necessarily *change* our mind, but *expand* our mind. When we listen with love and curiosity, we often find new perspectives revealed, different ways to see a complex challenge in light of the Gospel.

Some may say, "we should not talk about politics in church," but I believe that the Church is the one place we can talk about these things! After all, our unity is in Christ Jesus our Lord, and we are all humble sinners, saved by grace alone. Because of this, when my fellow Christian has a different view of something in the world, my love and respect for them frees me to listen fully and trust that they, too, desire abundant life for every human being.

Every week we pray, *united as one voice*, "thy kingdom come, they will be done, on earth as it is in heaven." We may have different ideas on the best path to create this reality, but we are wholeheartedly united in this prayer, God's dream for the world.

While the world is arguing, we are working and doing ministry. While the world is dividing, we are uniting around this table of grace. While the world feels despair, we are filling with an everlasting hope. Thank you, Good Shepherd, for being the body of Christ. Thank you for shining kindness, compassion, and love for all to see.




Building Blocks Preschool Kathy Rebholz, Director
