


Good Shepherd Care Ministry By Edwina Kelley

There were games and crafts in the Narthex, with
cookie decorating and egg hunts held outside. The
gorgeous weather brought us 94 families, with only 19 families being from Good
Shepherd. All 288 people (153 kids!) had a great time.

We had fifteen volunteers from the congregation (middle and high schoolers plus a few adults) run the games, plan and oversee the crafts, and hide 1,800 eggs! This community event wouldn't be possible without the help of all these generous people, and we look forward to even more fun next year.



The Good Shepherd Mission Garden By Laura McCommis

"Following Christ, Growing in Faith, Sharing God's Love"

"Following God's Sun, Growing Crops in Faith, Sharing God's Food"

The Vision Statement for GSLC's Mission Garden is directly inspired by GSLC's Vision Statement. We began cultivating produce in 2014, starting with gardening in straw bales, including those leftover from the prior year's pumpkin patch along with additionally purchased bales. This was a surprisingly successful gardening method, but by 2017, we decided to transition to permanent raised beds to minimize planting costs each year. With the permanent beds, we enhanced our repertoire. Last year we raised early crops of sugar snap peas, spinach, Swiss chard and summer to fall crops of beans,



zucchini, yellow summer squash, okra, bell peppers, tomatoes and carrots. This year we will be debuting a potato crop as well as corn, squash and beans planted in the Haudenosaunee (Iroquois) tradition, planting these three plants in community, each giving to and receiving from the other.

Through the years, the Holy Spirit has directed us to food insecure members of our community to donate



the produce to, via various food pantries, Wings of Love and Care, and to members of Good Shepherd, as well as members of First Baptist Church of Ballwin. If you are experiencing food insecurity please contact one of the pastors, who will let us know how we can get fresh summer vegetables to you.

The mission gardeners wish to thank the Men's Basecamp group for composting the planting beds and the Be Like Jesus youth participants for spreading straw in the aisles around beds to prevent weed growth and painting numbers on the beds for recording annual crop rotation and easing communications among gardeners. Planting has already started in the garden, but it is not too late to get in on the action...more planting to come and



all of the harvesting. New garden team members are always welcome, with or without prior experience! Typically planting is done as a group and harvesting is done independently or paired up with someone with a bit of gardening experience.

Be Like Jesus By Emily Horning

From March 31 to April 1, 47 kids from grades 3rd – 8th participated in a service lock-in. On Friday we had fellowship, worship (with some great songs), and then spent the night in the gym. On Saturday we prepared for a day of service. Each group, divided up by grade, had different service projects.





We made 350 bologna and cheese sandwiches for Trinity Soulard, spread hay and painted numbers on the beds in the Good Shepherd garden, created bracelets for With God's Little Ones to be sent to Madagascar and Cambodia, budgeted and

shopped for 21 meals for Circle of Concern- then delivered the meals there and went on a tour, organized and put on an egg hunt for the families of residents at Meramec Bluffs Senior Living Community, and raked piles of leaves and cleared lots and lots of lawn debris at the Hedgewood property. At LifeBridge we helped pack and inventory the items for 35 food boxes for Easter meals plus lots of fresh food to over 150 individuals. We helped pack hygiene kits for families and treat bags to welcome children who come and get food from the LifeBridge Market each week. We also participated in a game that taught about the budgeting needs of families and the struggles faced by families in poverty. Finally we stuffed 1,400 eggs for Good

Shepherd's egg hunt, made 50 dog toys out of old Be Like Jesus shirts for the APA of Missouri, assembled hygiene kits and made cards for Wings of Love and Care, made lots of other crafts for shut-ins, and cleaned windows around the church.

It was a very busy weekend! We had a lot of fun and we helped a lot of people. Thank you to all who helped with this awesome event!



Spotlight on Service Team By Judy Leach

The Service Team continues to be very active, mostly behind the scenes at Good Shepherd! We spend a lot of time planning and organizing collections in the narthex according to a Council approved calendar that we use every year. We just finished the Reverse Plate offering project and were amazed, once again, at the generosity of the congregation which supported Lutheran World Relief with 131 hygiene kits, Wings of Love and Care with 150 small bags of personal care items, and St. Patrick's Center with a huge donation of food for their food pantry! Many thanks to all who contributed and helped distribute the donations, particularly the Chronologically Gifted group that assembled the hygiene kits and the Be Like Jesus participants who filled the personal care item bags!

The Baby Shower for the month of May is coming up! There will be a Pack-n-Play set up in the narthex to collect supplies and clothes for babies and children, for Lutheran Family and Children's Services.

The Service Team also allocates Local Benevolence funds to non-profits that have been carefully vetted and whose missions align with ours. We choose themes for our giving. In January and February we used the theme of "Those Who Serve" and sent \$750 donations to the USO of Missouri, ELCA Missions for their work in Russia and Papua New Guinea, Missouri Veteran's Endeavor, (provides housing and support services to homeless veterans), and Lutheran Disaster Response for earthquake relief in Turkey and Syria.

Our theme for March and April was "Those Who Hunger". We allocated \$1,000 donations to Manna4Life, (serves impoverished people in a forcibly relocated village in Cambodia), the Peanut Butter Project (provides food to malnourished kids in several African countries), and Meds and Food for Kids, (provides food to starving children in Haiti).
