Storytelling has been one of the most powerful means of communication throughout history. Stories have the ability to touch so many people — as a teenager, you may have had an instant connection with a character in a novel that shaped your viewpoints, or as a parent or grandparent, you may have fond memories of reading bedtime stories to a child and watching their eyes grow wide with wonder. Stories are a truly unique way to learn about the world and those in it.

As part of the 30 Day Easter challenge, Pastor Josh encouraged us to introduce ourselves to someone new at church. He asked us to do more than just say "Hi, my name is Christina" and ask about their afternoon plans. He asked us to dig a little deeper beneath the surface and learn more about our brothers and sisters in Christ. Along this vein, the Stewardship Team is starting a new mission called "Our Stories." These stories are from members within our congregation revealing how God has worked in their lives and how Good Shepherd has played a part in that journey. Starting May 2, we will share one story a month collected from a cross-section of our members. A new story will be published on the first Thursday of each month and will be shared via email, on our social networking channels, and on our website.

Good Shepherd is blessed with a diverse community. Despite being nestled in suburban St. Louis, we welcome members from across the country and globe, those who came to us from different faiths, and we span all ages, genders, and orientations. Through "Our Stories" we will learn more about our brothers and sisters at Good Shepherd which will not only bring us closer as a community, but help each of us reflect on our own faith journey.

The Stewardship Team hopes that "Our Stories" will inspire each of you to reach out to those down the pew from you and share your story with them as we continue to grow in faith as a community and share stories from those nearest to us.



Burge, a social scientist (and part time pastor) who is essentially the preeminent researcher on trends in religious participation in the United States. The data is clear. Participation in faith communities is in decline across the board. (Yes, even in those bigger, shinier churches. But yes, most markedly in mainline Protestantism.) The fastest growing religious demographic in the nation is those who espouse, "nothing in particular." Council has been reading Burge's latest book together and I recently attended a community faith-leaders gathering hosted by the Mayor of Manchester, Mike Clement. We talked about how civic engagement is mirroring the same trend of decline. I was very impressed with the creative work Manchester is doing to build community. Check it out here:

When we look at these daunting numbers it would be easy to just get discouraged. While many aspects of our ministry at Good Shepherd are thriving, we are not immune to power of this societal trend. Yet, I see signs of growth and hope around us. Despite the upstream effort of doing ministry in a de-churching world, I am grateful to see our music ministry growing and our Wednesday youth ministry thriving!

How is Good Shepherd continuing to grow (even if slowly) against the forceful tide of decline?

The firm foundations that were built long ago, continue enabling ministry today.

Wise decisions were made about buildings and finances year ago, that allow us to be debt-free with a fantastic facility today. Faithful leaders created a culture of risk-taking, stepping out in faith to try new ministries and ideas (Feed the Need, Mission Trips, etc.). Prayerful disciples formed a mission-minded culture of hospitality that has blossomed into one of the most welcoming and generous congregations I have ever seen! Thanks be to God for the Spirit-led leadership of those who came before us. Inspired by their example, we now ask:

What's next?

Council has formed team to explore how we can build and sustain a thriving church far into the future. We are just beginning this process of prayerful listening and I hope you will share your heart with us in one of the many listening sessions in the coming weeks. (May 19 at 10 am is our general session in the gym)
When you think about the future of Good Shepherd what excites you? What worries you? What are our unique gifts as a church, and where is God calling us?
How is God calling us to steward the gifts we have been given so we can build a thriving church for our children, grandchildren, and the people who will be here 50 years from now?

When this ministry began in the gym of Good Shepherd back in 2007, who could imagine how much it would expand over the next 18 years! It has been amazing to see the movement of the Holy Spirit awakening hearts

end of school, picnics, vacations, gardening, or how to honor mothers. Years ago, May Day (May 1st) was considered the start of summer and many countries and cultures celebrated this with dancing, singing and food. In the United States, May baskets were filled with flowers or treats and left secretly at someone's front door. May Day celebrations have faded over time, but sharing kindness is still relevant.

Good Shepherd is filled with welcoming, kind and caring people who were originally invited, as strangers, into our community of believers. Data and new members' comments indicate that people come to a church because of a personal invitation and they return because they are welcomed and asked to come back.
